Message from the Co-Chairs

2023-2024 has been a critical year for our State in addressing domestic, family and sexual violence. In late 2023, we had a week in which four South Australian women were murdered, allegedly by a man known to them, in what was the worst week for fatal domestic and family violence within any jurisdiction in Australian history. This week galvanised our communities and prompted Embolden to lead the call for a Royal Commission into domestic, family and sexual violence. The Premier heeded this call, announcing in December 2023 that a Royal Commission would commence on 1 July 2024.

2023-2024 also saw wide-ranging efforts by the South Australian and Federal Governments to tackle the devastating impacts that domestic, family and sexual violence continue to have on the safety, freedom, equity and respect of South Australian women, children and all people experiencing violence. However, the specialist DFSV sector continues to face challenges from significant and increasing demand for services in the context of restrictive funding. Strategic planning and investment that places people with lived experience of violence at its centre remains crucial in understanding and meeting diverse community need across our State.

Throughout the year, Embolden was privileged to advocate for SA's specialist DFSV sector and provide advice to the State Government on a range of key issues and reforms, including draft legislation to criminalise coercive control and the review of SA's sexual consent laws. Embolden also continued to advocate at the national level as a member of the National Alliance of Domestic and Family Violence Specialist Services and progressed a Roadmap for Lived Experience Engagement for SA's specialist DFSV sector, to be launched shortly.

Looking forward, the Royal Commission provides a critical opportunity for transformative change in how our State prevents and responds to domestic, family and sexual violence. A strong and sustainable specialist domestic, family and sexual violence sector and workforce is key to driving real change in our communities. Embolden looks forward to continuing to work alongside and advocating for the incredible individuals and organisations whose commitment to ending violence against women and children remains our inspiration. Thank you once again to our members and Board for your tireless work and support of Embolden. Thanks also to the 2023-2024 staff of Embolden - Mary Leaker, Bindy Taylor and Liz Somers - for your dedication to Embolden's vision.

General Manager's Report

2023-2024 saw another busy year with significant changes for Embolden. I was appointed as General Manager in July 2023. Bindy Taylor came on board part-time as Engagement & Operations Officer in February 2024, with Liz Somers assisting with communications three hours per week. This additional support has been invaluable as Embolden continued to engage and support our incredible member organisations. Three new members joined Embolden this year, with our membership now sitting at 23 sector members and 5 associate members.

Embolden engaged our members through regular sector member meetings, monthly e-newsletters, and site visits and individual meetings. In addition to regular communication, Embolden facilitated two targeted workshops: on the Department for Correctional Services Women's Action Plan in April 2024 and on preparing for the Royal Commission, held with metropolitan sector members in June 2024.

Embolden either convened or presented at 18 events and undertook more than 20 media engagements in our efforts across the year to raise awareness, influence policy and advocate for the specialist sector and for people experiencing domestic, family and sexual violence.

Embolden engaged organisations and audiences on a broad range of issues including:

- The call for a Royal Commission
- Funding for frontline services
- Intimate partner homicide
- Coercive control
- Serial domestic and family violence offending
- Justice responses to sexual violence
- Intimate partner violence among adolescents
- Dating app safety





Once again Embolden held a candlelight vigil to mark Domestic and Family Violence Remembrance Day. The Vigil was held on 1 May 2024 at the Pioneer Women's Memorial Garden and attended by approximately 200 invited guests, including Premier Peter Malinauskas and Minister Katrine Hildyard. We were privileged to have Greg Ireland speak to us to honour and remember his beloved daughter Chelsea, who was murdered along with her partner Lukasz, by Lukasz' father.

Embolden also convened and organised a rally at Parliament House in November 2024 to call for a Royal Commission into domestic, family and sexual violence, and hosted a sector networking lunch on the day with members of Parliament.

Across the year, Embolden had the privilege to present at forums hosted by a broad range of organisations; including the Courts Administration Authority (Judicial Development Day), SACOSS, the Women's and Children's Hospital (child and adolescent psychiatry trainees), Women's Safety Services SA, Soroptomist International South Australia, Rotary (Walk for Respect), Carers SA, Western Collaboration Against Family and Domestic Violence, and the University of the Third Age.



2023-2024 also saw proposed legislative changes, as well as a number of State and Federal Government initiatives in the DFSV space. I cannot overstate my gratitude to Embolden's sector members for their ongoing engagement with Embolden to ensure that our policy submissions, consultation input and advocacy over the year benefited from the professional expertise of specialist domestic, family and sexual violence services. Members' support of Embolden's work, in the context of significant increasing demand and complexity for services, is greatly appreciated.

The year also brought exciting opportunities to partner. Embolden engaged Flinders University criminology students to undertake Industry Projects on early intervention and restorative justice approaches in the area of domestic, family and sexual violence. In addition, we worked with the Domestic and Family Violence Safety Alliance to develop a roadmap for lived experience engagement in consultation with survivor-advocates and the DFSV sector, in support of our commitment to actively include and respect those with diversity of lived experience. We were fortunate to have two fantastic Social Work students – Roshni Thattengat and Ruby Hoffman – leading this project.

At a national level, Embolden represented the South Australian specialist DFSV sector on the National Plan Advisory Group, the National Alliance of DFSV Specialist Services, the National Women's Safety Alliance and on the board of WESNET, the national peak body for the domestic and family violence services sector.

Looking forward, the next 12 months – with SA's Royal Commission in progress – are a pivotal moment for our State in addressing the scourge of domestic, family and sexual violence. Embolden looks forward to continuing to work in partnership with our members, people with lived experience, government, social and community services sector colleagues and the broader community to drive real change across our communities.

Note 1. Material accounting policy information

The accounting policies that are material to the incorporated association are set out below. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The incorporated association has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Basis of preparation

In the committee members' opinion, the incorporated association is not a reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements.

These are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purposes of complying with the South Australian legislation the Associations Incorporation Act 1985, and associated regulations. The committee members have determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members of Women's Emergency Services Coalition of South Australia Inc.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 107 'Statement of Cash Flows', AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors', AASB124 Related Party Disclosues, AASB 1048 'Interpretation of Standards' and AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures', as appropriate for not-for profit oriented entities.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Revenue recognition

The incorporated association recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the incorporated association is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the incorporated association: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Sales revenue

Membership and training fees are recognised when received or receivable.

Grants income

Grants are recognised at their fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions are complied with.

Note 1. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Income tax

As the incorporated association is a charitable institution in terms of subsection 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the incorporated association for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2024. The incorporated association has not yet assessed the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations.

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Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Women's Emergency Services Coalition of South Australia Inc.

Report on the Financial Report

We have audited the accompanying financial report being a special purpose financial report, of Women's Emergency Services Coalition of South Australia Inc., which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2024, the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, notes to the financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the board members' declaration.

In our opinion the accompanying financial report of Women's Emergency Services Coalition of South Australia Inc. is prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the accounting policies described in the notes to the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Basis of Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of our report. We are independent of the registered entity in accordance with the *Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985* (Act) and the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's *APES 110 Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of preparation. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the registered entity's financial reporting responsibilities under the *Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985*. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibility of the Responsible Entities for the Financial Report

The responsible entities of the registered association are responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985* and the needs of the members. The responsible officers' responsibility also includes such internal control as the responsible officers determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the members are responsible for assessing the registered entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the responsible officers either intend to liquidate the registered entity or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.
